

Biography

Chulayuth Lochotinan Conductor



Chulayuth Lochotinan enjoys a muti-faceted career as a conductor as well as a management professional.

Chulayuth Lochotinan studying the piano in 1987 with Dr. Motoko Funakoshi at Robinson School of Music in Thailand. He was a Music Scholar at Harrow School in England and was trained under Colin Stone for piano and Dimitar Burov for violin. He regularly performed as a soloist as well as in ensembles and won numerous First Prize of the Annual Piano Competitions. He was granted the Leadership Award by His Majesty King Hussein of Jordan in 1999. He performed in various concerts with the Harrow School Or-

chestra, including the 'Millenium Churchill Songs' at the Royal Albert Hall in 2000.

In 2001, Chulayuth gained entrance at Trinity College, Oxford University. He received the Britton Award in 2002 and became the conductor of the Trinity Orchestra. He actively performed in concerts, which included conducting the Oxford Charity Concert fund raising in aid of Sudan Crisis. He graduated with a Master of Engineering in 2005.

Chulayuth worked at Accenture as a consultant in Financial Services in London. He continued to give public performances which included conducting the UBS Orchestra in a fundraising concert for The Bridge Academy, Prince Charles' 'The Prince's Trust' and Premiere of Alvin Curran's 'Maritime Rites' at the Millennium Bridge in London.

At present, Chulayuth is a Senior Project Manager at Thomson Reuters. In his spare capacity, he has been invited as a guest lecturer and speaker at various institutions such as Chulalongkorn University and ThailandSPIN (Software Process Improvement Network). Chulayuth founded the Bangkok Charity Orchestra (BCO) in 2010 with the aim to raise funds to support various charity foundations in Thailand. He is also the Chairman of the Committee for the Thailand's first Steinway Youth Piano Competition and one of the judges for the Steinway Competition in Singapore in 2012.

Nattawat Luantampol Concert Master



Nattawat started his first violin lessons when he was 8 years old. After he started for 6 month he has been selected to perform solo violin in the HM King's composition "Love at Sundown" and "Near Dawn" for Princess Soamsawali of Thailand at Anfagro Intelligence #1.

At 10 years old, Nattawat moved to have lesson with Aj. Phukorn (Suthin) Srinarong. And now he is studying with Aj. Thaweewet Srinarong (Paye Vietrio).

In 2008, Nattawat was a member of Thai Youth Orchestra (TYO) at 11 years old. He has been the Concertmaster of TYO since 2011 at the age of 15.

Nattawat is a member of the Bangkok Charity Orchestra (BCO) from 2011.

In 2008 and 2009 he was selected to join the Gunma Junior Orchestra to perform at its Christmas Concert in Tokyo, Japan.

In 2008 He passed the audition to UNITY project 2008 by Bundit Ungrangsee where he was the youngest member of this project.

At present, Nattawat is studying at Prasarnmit Demonstration school (Secondary) Mathayom 4 in Science major. He accepted the High Score Certificate and Certificate of Excellent Discipline every year.

Paye Srinarong *Violin*



A versatile violinist, composer and music producer, Paye Srinarong is the first ever recipient of HRH Princess Galyani Vadhana Classical Music Funds.

The first Thai violinist to perform at Carnegie Hall with world-renowned Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, Paye's musical endeavor has also taken him to major concert venues and festivals across Asia, Europe (London's Royal Festival Hall, France, Italy, Austria, Hungary, and Poland) and the USA (Aspen, Music Academy of the West, Spoleto, etc.) He was concertmaster of Purcell School Symphony, Yale Philharmonia,


Stony Brook Orchestra and guest concertmaster of Bangkok Symphony Orchestra (BSO). In 2006 Paye was appointed the first ever concertmaster of the New York Asian Symphony, leading the ensemble in concerts at the Lincoln Center (Avery Fisher, Alice Tully), the United Nations NYC and toured Japan twice. His recent performances at the Thailand Cultural Center of Mozart 3 rd Violin Concerto and Tchaikovsky Violin Concerto under his father's baton received rave reviews from critics.

Since his solo debut as a ten-year-old and with the BSO at the age of fifteen, Paye has been giving recitals in Thailand on a regular basis. He has been guest concertmaster of the BSO and offers violin classes to young musicians all over the country. In the hope of expanding classical music to a wider audience, "VieTrio", a cross-over band with his two sisters, was launched to a critical acclaim. Collaborating with X'Act, GMM Grammy, VieTrio have released 4 albums, a DVD and a book in the past three years with Paye as a performer, songwriter and co-producer with many songs going top of the charts. Upon given sell out concerts in Thailand, VieTrio have performed at the 2010 World Expo in Shanghai, 2011 Qatar Open tennis, and in Singapore and Laos. VieTrio is also available on iTunes.

Educated in London, Paye attended the Purcell School and Royal Academy of Music before graduating with First Class Honors. He subsequently relocated to the States to obtain his Master and Artist Diploma Degrees from Yale University and currently pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts degree at Stony Brook University, NY, where he served as Teaching Assistant to the world renowned Emerson Quartet. His important teachers include Prof. Phukorn (Suthin) Srinarong, Erich Gruenberg, the late Erick Friedman, Masao Kawasaki, Cho-Liang Lin, Pamela Frank, Ani Kavafian, Soovin Kim, Philip Setzer, Amadeus, Tokyo, and the Emerson String Quartets.

Besides performing extensively, Paye enjoys teaching music in NYC, and at his family at their Viemus Music School, featured in major magazines, newspapers, TV and radio both at home and aboard. He enjoys good food, sports and supports Arsenal FC fanatically.

Programme Note



Peter Ilych Tchaikovsky (1840-1893) was an eminent and one of the most loved Russian composers from the Romantic period. He was born into a well-to-do middle class family where music was much cultivated in the household. However, when growing up, he went to and graduated from law school in St Petersburg while still continued taking music lessons. After graduation, he took a job as a bureau clerk and although working hard, he hated his job and became more and more absorbed in music.

When Anton Rubinstein, one of the most celebrated pianists and composers, opened Russia's first conservatory in St Petersburg in 1862, the 22-year-old Tchaikovsky enrolled and was its first composition student. Tchaikovsky graduated 2 years later and began his journey on the musical path which finally led him to great success as composer and conductor.

Although Tchaikovsky was very successful in his musical career, his personal life had always been imbued with deep emotional crises and depression which were further magnified by his overly sensitive nature; his beloved mother's untimely death from cholera during his teen, his disastrous marriage which lasted only 2-3 months and his tendencies towards homosexuality which was prohibited in Imperial Russia at the time.

The cause of his untimely death at 53 in 1893 has long been controversial; ranging from cholera through drinking contaminated water, long-term effects of smoking and drinking to suicide.

Tchaikovsky left us with numerous masterpieces in almost every form of musical compositions including 3 great scores for the ballet, 4 concertos, 6 symphonies, 8 operas, chamber music, tone-poems and over 100 songs.

Russian classical ballet has been hailed as one of the world's most celebrated dance traditions and Tchaikovsky's music to these dances is undoubtedly a major part of this success. His 3 greatest ballets namely; Swan Lake, Sleeping Beauty and the Nutcracker, are truly the cornerstones of the Romantic ballet tradition.

Tchaikovsky's ballet music is not only danceable but also provides emotional drama to the story through beautiful melodies and superb orchestration.

For tonight's concert, Bangkok Charity Orchestra (BCO) is proud to feature 2 highlights from these great ballets; **Music from the First act of the "Swan Lake"** to open the programme and the famous **Waltz from the "The Sleeping Beauty"** to end the programme.

In the field of symphony, Tchaikovsky wrote altogether 6 completed symphonies of which the last three of these have been hailed as the greatest Romantic symphonies and some of the most popular masterworks. In Tchaikovsky's opinion the symphony is "the most lyrical of all musical forms" and "Should it not express all the things for which words cannot be found, which nevertheless arise in the heart and demand expression?", he asked.

Tchaikovsky completed his **Symphony No. 5 in E minor, Op 64** in 1888. Its 4 huge movements unfold like an epic film on the life of the most dramatic and sensitive artist.

The first movement opens with a deeply moving slow introduction (andante) before changing the over all mood when entering the first movement proper in a faster tempo (allegro con anima). The second movement is a slow and lyrical movement (andante cantabile) with the melting famous theme. The third is a waltz movement based on a street song the composer heard in Florence, Italy. The Symphony ends in a blaze of bravura movement.

The **Violin Concerto in D major, Op 35**, was written during 1878. It was dedicated to the legendary violinist and teacher, Leopold Auer, who, however, pronounced it unplayable and declined the honour. Later on in 1879 it was premiered in New York and 2 years later in Vienna with not so much success. However, the piece soon recovered from its devastating start and gradually launched on its triumphant progress through the world's concert halls. It has now been regarded as one of the big violin concertos that every soloist has in his repertoire.

The Concerto is in 3 standard movements; fairly fast (allegro moderato) - a slow lyrical canzonetta (andante) - fast and very lively (allegro vivacissimo).

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
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
